

Mobile Kitchens Expand Vital Outreach

A welcome sight for struggling families and individuals, the Mission's two Mobile Kitchens make weekly visits to impoverished neighborhoods in Bridgeport and South Norwalk. Each truck is operated by a group of caring volunteers who provide nourishing meals, encouraging words and uplifting prayer for men, women and children who are hungry – in so many ways – but unable to come to our dining room on our main campus. The Mobile Kitchens touch the lives of thousands of individuals each year, allowing volunteers to assess their needs and offer additional guidance and resources through the Mission's comprehensive programs.

To meet the growing need, the Mission recently expanded this outreach, adding a

A Socard Chance and the opportunity to share it with others


hen Allen was 4 years old, his father was killed in a car accident that left his mother severely disabled. "It was tough growing up," he recalls. "By the time I was 16, I had learned to numb my feelings by drinking and smoking marijuana."

He later married, but his destructive behaviors prevented him from being responsible for his family. He and his wife separated and he returned home to care for his ailing mother. When it became necessary to place her in a nursing home, he fell apart.

"I felt I had lost the most important ladies in my life," Allen shares. As his addiction and despair escalated, his life spiraled downhill, leaving him virtually homeless. "I knew if I stayed like this I was going to die," he explains. He called shelters and treatment facilities asking for help... until someone suggested Bridgeport Rescue Mission.

Allen joined our New Life Program and was empowered by our faith-based curriculum to embrace personal growth and change. "For a lot of us, our emotional maturity is low due to the drugs and alcohol," he explains. "The courses help us look at our childlike behaviors and to grow up and mature."

Allen's grateful for your gifts, which have given him and others this life-changing opportunity. "Without the people who give to the Mission, we wouldn't have a second chance," he says. He explains that your giving also allowed him, and allows program residents like him, to share those second chances with others while assisting with the Mission's many outreaches.



"The Mission has a homeless shelter... a food pantry and Mobile Kitchens... and offers clothing," he explains. "So everything people donate to the Mission is passed on to someone else."

For Allen, his growing and deepening relationship with God has given him hope for a future of joy and meaning. "Until I got to the Mission, my use for God was more on rainy days. Today, I acknowledge His presence... I thank Him... and I will continue to study His Word so the change in my life is permanent."

Food

Three meals each day – seven days a week – are served in our dining room to Mission residents, emergency shelter guests and community members who can't make it to our dining room, while our Mobile Kitchens distribute food to hungry adults and children in impoverished neighborhoods. Pantry Bags are provided weekly for families struggling to make ends meet, and thousands of turkeys and Thanksgiving fixings bags are distributed during our annual *Great ThanksGiving Project*.

Clothing

The blessing of clean clothing helps restore the dignity of hurting men, women and children. Gently used shirts, pants and coats – and garments that are appropriate for interviews or other important events – are given free of charge to those in our care and in our community through our Blessing Rooms and at our daily Mobile Kitchen stops.

Shelter

Men, women and mothers with children find clean, safe beds in a faith-based environment. After their essential needs are met – food, showers and clothing – they're offered the guidance and resources they need to overcome temporary challenges, or to take the next steps toward long-term transformation.

Addiction Recovery

Through our New Life Program, men and women seeking to overcome addiction and other life challenges are empowered with the tools to transform their lives. Through spiritual guidance, life-skills training, adult education and supportive housing, they become stable and contributing members of the community.

Supportive Housing for Men and Women

The Supportive Housing Program provides graduates of our New Life Program with housing, case management and in-house apprenticeship positions to assist them in their transition to independent living. Residents are asked to pay a sliding fee based on their income or are assigned projects at the Mission until employment is secured.
