

The Mission's outreach to our community began in 1993, with the passionate efforts of founders Rev. Jim and Tammy Watson, who began cooking meals in local church kitchens and distributing them from the back of their station wagon. Those humble beginnings laid the foundation for a ministry that today brings hope to countless lives each year.

Today, we help provide...

- 550,000 meals yearly through our dining room, two Mobile Kitchens and Food Pantry, as well as our annual *Great ThanksGiving Project*.
- 37,690 nights of safe shelter yearly for men, women and children at our Men's and Women's Emergency Shelters and Guest House for Women and Children.
- Faith-based support for more than 90 men and women yearly in our New Life Program working to transform their lives.

As we remember our past and prepare for the future, we are grateful for friends like you who make our ministry possible. Thank you for continuing to stand alongside us.

"In Try God?"

t was 2004, and Larry Edwards had recently joined the Mission's New Life Program. Longing to overcome a decade of addiction, homelessness, lawlessness and separation from his loved ones, he was in a chapel service when the pastor posed this candid question – and Larry raised his hand!

"That's when my life began to change!" he says today.

Now the owner of a successful construction business, Larry has helped with many Mission projects in the years since his graduation in 2005, recently overseeing the extensive kitchen remodel. With each renovation, he is reminded of his own transformation.

"To me, the Mission is a place to get your head together," he says, recounting the long-term curriculum of life-skills classes and faith-based teachings that formed the foundation for a sober and stable life. "And after a few months in the program, they allowed me to go to work," he explains. "So I took it as an opportunity and started my business from there."

Larry also returns to the Mission monthly to play his guitar, talk about Bible teachings and share his testimony with other men in the very chapel service where he first opened his heart to the Lord. "I've had guys come up to me and tell me how I've helped them change their lives. When you get to help other people, that's what helps you grow inside."



Larry coming alongside Sammy, a graduate living in Supportive Housing. His frequent visits to the Mission also allow him to maintain important connections with the godly staff and mentors who have become his lifelong friends. He is especially grateful for the restoration of his family

who, during his troubled times, all but disowned him.

"We're very tight now," he says, recalling with pleasure a recent family reunion, caring for his grandchildren and the surprise party his wife organized for his 50th birthday.

Looking back at how far his life has come since he raised his hand to $try\ God$, Larry feels blessed by not only his business, friends and family, but also by the essentials he and his wife work hard for – their home, a freezer full of food, the ability to put gas in the car and go anywhere.

"I feel like I'm just beginning," he says, "and there's so much more I can accomplish. When you become a productive member of society, you feel empowered. You feel free."

As the Mission marks 25 years of bringing hope to the lost and broken, we thank Larry for sharing his story of how, through support from friends like you, lives are transformed.
